CT and MRI scanners operational

In October 2019, the Radiology team and LHCH colleagues were delighted to have two state of the art scanners installed in the scanner suite to meet the demand on the service.

The department has increased the number of CT scanners from one to two and the number of MRI scanners from two to three. Both scanners are the latest state of the art equipment and will further improve both patient and staff experience.



Further improvement works to the department are ongoing to extend and improve Radiology Services – helping to provide a centre of excellence for diagnostics.

New Catheter Laboratory complete

Building works to create a brand new Cath Lab facility within the department is now complete.

The new lab (pictured with Jeanette Broome, Cath Lab Manager) will provide decant facilities to enable refurbishment

of the other labs over the next 2-3 years. The new innovative layout and equipment are designed to facilitate the 'best' patient care possible.



Respiratory Response Car pilot

This winter, LHCH commenced a pilot to run a Respiratory Response Car in collaboration with North West Ambulance Service.

This commenced on 2nd December 2019 and will run until 31st January 2020. The service will respond to appropriate 999 calls for respiratory conditions and, depending on the patient's condition, will review and refer

to the Community Service or advise on transfer to hospital if required.

The service enables the LHCH Community Respiratory Team to provide patients with treatment at home if required e.g. antibiotics.

It is envisaged that this service will increase the hospital admission avoidance options the CCG already has in place consequently decreasing avoidable hospital admissions.

The service, provided by the multidisciplinary team, is the first of its kind in the country and has attracted lots of interest nationally from healthcare colleagues.

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Professor Rod Stables appointment to BHF Research Collaborative

Professor Rod Stables has been appointed to the role of Clinical Lead for the British Heart Foundation Clinical Research Collaborative.

This vital role will provide the essential clinical leadership to support the planning and delivery of world-class clinical research in all aspects of cardiovascular disease.

Prof Stables is consultant cardiologist at LHCH. He was the Chair of the Academic and Research Committee at the British Cardiovascular Society and holds academic appointments at the University of Liverpool and Imperial College, London.

The newly established BHF Clinical Research Collaborative aims to unite and coordinate the current clinical research efforts of the existing professional societies and clinical research groups in heart and circulatory

His clinical interests include coronary intervention including emergency Primary Percutaneous Coronary Intervention (PPCI), TAVI, and nonsurgical septal reduction in hypertrophic cardiomyopathy. He founded the Clinical Trials and Evaluation Unit at the Royal Brompton Hospital and led its initial flagship ventures.

His research interests are focused on the democratization of clinical research.

seeking to simplify the design, conduct and reporting of clinical trials, and other forms of outcomes analysis. This is exemplified in the conduct of the HEAT-PPCI trial (the largest ever single-centre trial and the only study to recruit 100% of eligible patient presenting with the clinical syndrome of interest).

Prof Stables' term as the BHF CRC Clinical Lead role has now commenced and runs until the end of May 2021.

AIM HY INFORM clinical trial

September 2018 saw the launch of the Liverpool Centre for Cardiovascular Science (LCCS) - a collaboration between LHCH, **Liverpool Health Partners and Liverpool University.**

Professor Gregory Lip, Consultant Cardiologist, has now moved to Liverpool and has begun bringing in many research trials, linked to the challenges faced by the population in Merseyside. One of these is hypertension.

High blood pressure is very common in our local population and is commonly poorly managed. Despite being on

medication many patients do not have a blood pressure that is within optimal limits, leaving them

The AIM HY trial, which the LCCS is participating in. looks at the links between ethnicity and blood pressure seeking to understand the best combination drug

therapies for patients. It is far too early to determine the results of the trial, but some of the patients currently involved are seeing positive effects on their



Innovation of the Year Award sponsored by the Innovation Agency

The joint winners of this award were announced as **Julie Tyrer**, Tissue Viability Nurse Consultant and **Motor Evoked Potentials (MEP) Team**.



"Julie is a real innovator. As the excellent professional she is, she is always looking at how

to improve the service she provides to her patients. Over the last year she has developed two innovations – both of which have proved helpful and improved outcomes. She developed MINIMISE as an anagram to remind ward staff how to prevent and reduce skin ulcers caused by moisture. She also developed a logo which is now under trademark application and is expected to be shared nationally. Julie also developed an idea to reduce pressure ulcers in the heel area."

"In September 2018 the Aortic Surgical Team were left without team members to perform neurophysiological monitoring during aortic aneurysm surgery. Lee Robertson and Gary Theobald (MEP Team), Operating Department Practitioners expressed an interest in taking on this essential role. Paralysis is an associated risk of this kind of surgery so it was essential this was resolved quickly. Following training, Lee and Gary now form the direct link with the surgeon relaying deviations in measurements that they take and record from the numerous electrodes they have inserted into the patient, with the aim of preventing paralysis in the patient. After thirteen months they have taken ownership of the role and there has been not one recorded lower limb paralysis and they have become an integral part of the Aortic Surgical Team."



How long have you worked here
and why LHCH?

I've worked here for 28 years. I

moved to Liverpool from Bristol after my nurse training and became a Theatre Scrub Nurse at LHCH. I've never wanted or felt the need to work anywhere else.

Tell us a little more about your role

The role of a Surgical Care Practitioner (SCP) is very diverse. The role is specific to every hospital and this also applies within the department as we do not all have the same role.

As a specialist centre we carry out a wide range of surgery here including cardiac, thoracic, aortic, ACHD, vascular and robotic. Surgical Care Practitioners have a clinical skill set to support specific operation(s) and I tend to support aortic cases on the whole.

The role is constantly developing to meet demand. For example, there has been an expansion of the role to manage the reduction in the availability of junior doctors.

As the lead SCP I also have a wider remit in terms of the management of the team, planning and administration of SCPs across operating theatres in consideration of junior doctor rota.

Describe a typical day

We would start the day with a Theatre team meeting and then a separate team brief in the operating theatre that we are allocated to. Following this, we would work to prepare the theatre for the patient.

Depending on the type of surgical procedure the length of operation varies massively and can be anything from a two hour Trans Catheter Aortic Valve Implantation (TAVI) case to a twelve hour aortic aneurysm procedure. Team work during an operation is absolutely essential and having the right mix of staff and skill set crucial. A key role of an SCP, along with the aortic fellow, is to be a calming influence and help resolve and smooth over any issues or sticky areas during the case.

What inspired you to pursue this role?

Two of the very first SCPs in the country were trained at this hospital 25 years ago and this sparked my interest in the role.

Within the Operating Theatre environment you can either progress and develop from a nurse to a Surgical Care Practitioner or go into Theatre Management. I chose the SCP path 18 years ago so I have been in this role much longer than I was a nurse!

What makes you most proud?

I am most proud of my team. I have officially been the lead for 12 months now and I think we feel greater ownership as a team in our own right.

We have also nationally increased our profile with other SCPs in the country. The team were recognised at the LHCH Outstanding Awards 2019 and received the CEO Special Appreciation Award. This was so unexpected and really well received.

We very much work behind the scenes and this brought the hard work and dedication of the team to the forefront.

Alistair Marshall, Surgical Care Practitioner, recently received a Long Service Award for 25 years from the Association of Cardiothoracic Surgical Care Practitioners (ACTSCP). This was presented to him by the President of SCTS, Mr Richard Page who is Consultant Thoracic Surgeon here at LHCH. Mr Brian Fabri, former Consultant Cardiac Surgeon here also attended the presentation and gave a moving speech as he had mentored Alistair for many years.

Do you have any advice for anyone who may be looking into a similar career path?

We currently have 3 trainees learning clinical skills in order to become a SCP. To start your career path you would need to be a qualified nurse for 2 years and have a minimum of two years Theatre experience. The training is taken over 3 years and is to Masters Level.

In order to be successful in the role it is important you have the right personality. You need to be able to accept criticism and be able to deal with difficult and challenging situations. You also have to be able to carry on in the event something goes wrong. It is high risk surgery and being able to remain composed and calm at all times is an absolute must. The role is very rewarding though and absolutely worth it.
