

Think Aorta – National Conference at LHCH

Healthy Lung Programme success

Liverpool's Healthy Lung Programme is improving early detection rates for lung cancers and undiagnosed COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease).

The collaborative programme was launched by NHS Liverpool Clinical Commissioning Group in April 2016, to help find and treat as many cases of lung cancer and COPD in the city, as early as possible.

The programme has been inviting those aged 58 – 70 years, who have ever smoked and who live in areas of the city where lung cancer and COPD rates are highest, to attend a Healthy Lung Clinic at their local GP surgery for a short assessment of their lung health.

One patient to benefit from attending a Healthy Lung Clinic is 70-year-old Dennis Kerrigan, from Kirkdale near Everton.

He said: "I've worked in Kirkdale as a men's barber for the past 50 years and when I received a letter inviting me to get checked, I responded immediately."

Following an appointment at his GP surgery, Dennis was referred for tests which revealed he needed to undergo surgery at LHCH. Seven weeks after

surgery, Dennis was given the all clear by his surgeon.

He said: "I feel so lucky to have had the cancer spotted so early and the care and treatment that I've received from everyone involved has been first class."

Dr Martin Ledson, a Consultant at LHCH, said: "The Healthy Lung Programme has proven highly

beneficial in helping to find more cases of lung cancer and other serious chest conditions such as COPD.

"Evidence shows that if lung cancers are found at an early stage, before any symptoms are showing, treatment can be offered with a much better outlook.

"Patients like Denis who have been diagnosed with lung cancer after



attending a Healthy Lung Clinic are so thankful that they were offered early tests and treatment because if their condition had been picked up later on, the outcomes may have been very different for them."

Get up, get dressed, get moving

We recently pledged our support to a new national campaign called *End PJ Paralysis*, which aims to get patients up and out of bed, dressed in their own clothes and moving as soon as they are well enough to do so.

Evidence shows that wearing pyjamas longer than necessary can make a patient feel vulnerable, whilst being mobile can help a patient recover more quickly from their surgery or treatment.

End PJ Paralysis has been rolled out across all our wards and our staff are working hard to embed this new approach.

Going digital with pulmonary rehab advice

Pulmonary rehabilitation patients attending the Breathe Programme at LHCH now have access to instant advice about managing flare-ups using their mobile devices.

The resource was developed to make the programme's support services more accessible. It uses augmentedreality videos of the hospital's own physiotherapists demonstrating breathing control and chest clearance techniques, along with interactive 3D images, which are available on smartphones and tablets. However a new piece of clever technology allows a printed brochure to come to life when a smartphone is held over it.

Anthony Burns, Senior Exercise Physiologist, said: "The aim was simple: to provide another way for patients to get practical tips when their breathing worsens. "It's an additional support to the Breathe programme and means patients and their families, with the use of a mobile phone or tablet, can find out more before they attend and if they're not up to the programme they can still access support and advice."

LHCH given top ratings

Earlier this summer, patients once again rated LHCH as one of the best hospitals in the country, in the Care Quality Commission's National Inpatient Survey 2016.

The annual survey of adult inpatients considered areas such as admission to hospital, the hospital ward, doctors and nurses, care and treatment, operations and procedures, leaving hospital, as well as the overall patient experience. It aims to highlight what patients think about the care and treatment they receive and the feedback helps trusts to understand where improvements can be made.

For LHCH it showed that we had been **rated number two in the country** for 'overall patient experience'.

The results also showed that 65% of our patients responded to the survey, significantly higher than the national response rate of 44%.
