



The HeartFlow FFRcT Analysis is the only non-invasive technology to offer physicians insight into both the extent of a patient's arterial blockage and the impact the blockage has on blood flow.

Coronary artery disease is the leading cause of death for both men and women in the UK. It develops when the arteries leading to the heart narrow, often because of the build-up of plaque in the vessel walls. This narrowing can reduce vital blood flow to the heart, causing chest pain and potentially heart attacks.

Studies have shown the need to improve the accuracy of non-invasive tests used to evaluate coronary artery disease.

"The HeartFlow Analysis is the only available non-invasive technology that provides you with two results from one test. There is a reduced need for repeat tests and a more efficient treatment pathway." said Dr

Improving care for coronary artery disease patients

LHCH clinicians now have access to non-invasive technology that helps them identify the appropriate treatment approach for patients with coronary artery disease

"We are one of the few NHS trusts in the UK using this technology and we expect it to help improve the way we manage our coronary artery disease patients. We are confident that it will be a game-changing technology."

Dr Joe Mills, Consultant Cardiologist at LHCH, added: "The HeartFlow Analysis provides a definitive understanding of both the anatomical and functional findings without any additional testing or risk for patients.

"This is likely to transform the quality of care we can provide for patients, ensuring the most accurate diagnosis and the best treatment plan as well as reducing the need for invasive coronary angiography – a procedure not without its risks."

The HeartFlow technology creates a personalised, digital 3D model of each patient's arteries using the images from a standard, non-

invasive coronary CT angiogram. Powerful computer algorithms then solve millions of complex equations to assess the impact of blockages on blood flow, and this information helps determine the most appropriate course of action for each patient.



BBC One comes to LHCH

TV broadcaster Angela Rippon recently visited LHCH to film a new BBC One health programme about the use of aspirin with heart patients.

As well as hearing from patients before and after their procedures, the programme featured extensive interviews inside and outside the catheter laboratories with Dr Raph Perry, Medical Director, and further discussions with Danny Forrest, Deputy Chief Pharmacist, about the history, usage and prescribing of aspirin.

LHCH is top in the country

LHCH has been scored as the best hospital in the country to work for and receive treatment in this year's national NHS Staff Survey

95% of staff recommended LHCH as a place to receive treatment – more than any other hospital and the highest score in the country.

The figures also showed that LHCH was ranked top in the country, among similar organisations, for nine out of 32 key areas, including:

- effective team working
- staff reporting good communication between

senior management and staff

- staff agreeing that their role makes a difference to patients
- staff being appraised in the last 12 months.

Carried out in Autumn 2016, the national survey was completed by more than 1,000 staff at LHCH – the highest response rate in the country (69%).

Jane Tomkinson, Chief Executive, said: "Knowing that more staff would recommend our own trust as a place to work or receive treatment than any other hospital in the country is very pleasing.

"We are grateful to every member of staff who took time to complete the survey, and we would like to assure them that their feedback will allow us to make further improvements to our services in the next 12 months."

Badminton player thanks lifesaving nurses

63-year-old Peter Ventre was playing badminton with friends at Knowsley Leisure Culture Park when he started to 'feel funny' and collapsed.

Thankfully, he was in the same building as staff from LHCH who were running their weekly community cardiac rehabilitation session.

Peter said: "All I remember is being convinced it was my partner's serve, before waking up in an ambulance and being told I'd had a heart attack."

Lisa Devitt, LHCH Cardiovascular Disease Nurse, was running the cardiac rehabilitation programme

and was one of the nurses to care for Peter.

She said: "As soon as we were made aware that Peter had collapsed, we immediately rushed to help. Our years of experience and cardiac training took over as we were able to care for him until the paramedics arrived.

After being taken by ambulance

for emergency treatment at LHCH, Peter added: "I can't believe what happened to me. I feel like I've got a second chance and I'm so thankful to the lovely amazing people for what they did."

The Liverpool FC fan is now back at the leisure centre with the same nurses who saved his life, undertaking a course of cardiac rehabilitation.

Surgical expertise shared

LHCH welcomed colleagues from Papworth Hospital NHS Foundation Trust in Cambridgeshire recently to provide specialist off-pump cardiac surgery training.

As part of a proctored training programme, LHCH Consultant Cardiac Surgeons Mr Mark Pullan and Mr Andrew Muir, teach colleagues about off-pump surgery. This is a technique which, evidence indicates, offers lower risk surgery for higher risk patients with as good a result if not better than traditional on-pump surgery.

Mr Pullan said: "We were contacted by clinicians at Papworth after they decided they needed this expertise within their unit. They contacted LHCH as we are the most prolific off–pump cardiac unit in the country, and we are in a unique position of being able to provide this specialist training."

"In the past 12 years, we have run similar courses to train consultants from around the UK which have

been successful in introducing offpump cardiac surgery to many units around the country."

The robotic surgery programme at LHCH

A recent World Health Organisation report has shown that heart and lung disease remain the major cause of death and disability in the world today

In the UK, over one quarter (28%) of all deaths are attributed to either heart or lung disease and it is believed that the economic burden to the country exceeds £10 billion annually. Sobering statistics indeed.

As one of the largest specialist centres for the treatment of complex heart and lung problems, LHCH is constantly striving to provide the very best and most cutting edge care for our patients.

We are already a leading centre for

minimally invasive surgical procedures, but we are at the absolute limit of the numbers of these procedures that can be performed without further investment.

So we are now preparing to lead the way, both regionally and nationally,

caring for people with heart and lung disease

with the introduction of a cardiac and thoracic robotic surgery programme.

Mr Paul Modi, Consultant Cardiac Surgeon at LHCH, said: "The benefits to our patients of this new programme will be enormous. We can significantly increase the numbers who can undergo minimally invasive surgery. We will be able to reduce their postoperative pain, lower the risks of infection and ensure that their stay in hospital is considerably reduced."

In addition to this, patients will not have to have the 'zipper stitching' often associated with the more traditional operation methods.

Mr Mike Shackcloth, Consultant Thoracic Surgeon at LHCH, added: "This new robotic programme will not only allow LHCH to provide better care for patients, but will also enable us to develop a training and research programme that will ensure that we can attract the top trainees and consultants to be part of LHCH in the future."

The total cost of establishing the programme will be £2 million and our fundraising plans are already well advanced but we need your help to finally reach our target.

Liverpool: 6 May Annual Members' Health Event and Open Day


Members enjoyed a fascinating morning at this year's Annual Members' Health Event and Open Day which included behind the scenes tours and a range of lifestyle advice.

Governor elections 2017

Elections are soon to take place to elect new Public and Staff Governors to the LHCH Council of Governors.

Public foundation trust members will vote for new Public Governors in Merseyside (three seats), Cheshire (two seats) and North Wales (two seats) while staff are voting for new Staff Governors in the Non Clinical group and Allied Health Professionals, Technical and Scientific group.
