# LHCH rated TOP in the country for 'care and treatment of patients'

Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital (LHCH) has once again scored amongst the very best NHS trusts in the country, according to the Care Quality Commission's (CQC) latest National Inpatient Survey, a position we have held for the last nine years.

The annual survey asked the views of a sample of 850 adults who had stayed overnight as an inpatient at LHCH. Feedback received from patients showed that we have one of the highest performing in the country and THE best place to receive care and treatment.

Out of 154 trusts, the results for LHCH showed that:

- we are top in the country for 'nurses within the hospital' category
- we are top in the country for 'care and treatment of our patients' category
- we are top in the country for cleanliness of wards
- we are the second best trust in the country for 'overall patient care'
- we are 'better' than the majority of trusts in all 11 survey sections.

The survey looks at areas such as admission to hospital, the hospital ward, doctors and nurses, care and treatment, operations and procedures, leaving hospital, as well as the overall patient experience. It aims to highlight what patients think about the care and treatment they receive and the feedback helps trusts to understand where improvements can be made.

We are delighted that Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital has been announced as one of the Best Places to Work in healthcare.

The Best Places to Work

# Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital wins CHKS data quality award

Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital is delighted to have been announced as joint winner of the CHKS Top Hospitals data quality award for specialist trusts 2015.

The CHKS Top Hospitals awards celebrate excellence throughout the UK and are given to acute sector organisations for their achievements in healthcare quality and improvement.

Tony Grayson, Head of Information Services at LHCH, said: "This is the fourth time in five years that we have won this award – a truly outstanding achievement,

for which we are all enormously proud."

The data quality award, which LHCH shared with Papworth Hospital, recognises the importance of clinical coding and data quality, and the essential roles they play in ensuring appropriate patient care. It is based on a range of coding indicators, including coding related to primary diagnosis.





#### Working further towards our vision to 'be the best'

Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital is making further steps in achieving our vision to 'be the best'. This year we are making a £11.2 million commitment to help us achieve this ambition.

Our investment includes:

- £4 million to increase staffing and capacity to deliver reductions in waiting lists, which will improve our patient experience
- £1.9 million invested in our teams to support an increase in standards
- £5.3m to enhance and maintain our estate and infrastructure.

As part of this we are working on the delivery of a brand new entrance for inpatients which will provide:

- a new focal point for all visitors to LHCH

- distinct entrance and signposting for inpatients making navigation around the site clearer
- 24/7 reception
- meet and greet volunteer presence
- a new café facility available to all
- improved switchboard facilities.

Our investment also includes work on our Outpatients Re-design Project, Cherry Ward, Discharge Lounge, Medical Equipment, IT Infrastructure, Electronic Patient Records and improvements to our signage.

# Liverpool cardiologists lead the way with pioneering new device

Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital (LHCH) has been selected as part of a pilot group of specialist heart centres across Europe to pioneer a newly approved leadless pacemaker.

We became the first hospital in the North West and only the fourth centre in the UK to trial the new device.

The 1.75g Medtronic device, measuring just 7mm x 26mm, and one-tenth the size of a traditional pacemaker, recently gained CE Mark approval from European regulators and is now set to be implanted into

780 patients from 50 clinical centres as part of an on-going global trial.

LHCH is at the forefront of pacemaker research and is one of Europe's busiest pacemaker implanting centres. Dr Archie Rao and Dr Mark Hall, who performed the first of its innovative new procedures, said this was a 'breakthrough in heart rhythm management'.

Dr Rao said: "This is a real advance in pacemaker technology, because the absence of leads should hopefully limit the associated complications that can sometime arise during

implantation and thereafter."

Dr Hall added:
"Having the pacemaker entirely within the heart means no scar and no visible pacemaker under the skin. A lot of patients

will prefer this. It may also mean that there is a lower risk of infection being transmitted into the heart as there is no risk of spread from the pacemaker pocket."

Traditional pacemakers are inserted under the skin and connected to the heart by a lead which is placed in the heart via a vein. The lead carries electrical signals to correct slow or irregular heartbeats, but they can require replacement due to broken or dislodged wires.

The new device can be implanted directly in the heart and delivers electrical impulses from an electrode, removing the need for a lead.

The device, suitable for selected patients with bradycardia, is delivered via a catheter from the groin and sits within the lower right chamber of the heart (right ventricle).

Commenting on the care he received from the team who implanted his new device, 73 year old Thomas Nesbitt from Vauxhall said: "All the doctors, cardiac physiologists and nurses who looked after me have been wonderful. I couldn't have wished for better care."



#### **Liverpool Lung Cancer Unit**

The Liverpool Lung Cancer Unit, which is a joint service between Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital and Royal Liverpool and Broadgreen University Hospital,

held its 11th Annual General Meeting recently. The unit utilises combined resources to improve services for patients with suspected lung cancer. Professor Martin Walshaw, Lead Clinician for the service and Consultant Respiratory Physician said:

"Our service here exceeds all national standards, providing 'state of the

art' diagnosis and treatment for over 400 patients per year (the largest in the region). The incidence of lung cancer is particularly high here in Liverpool and this makes our service even more important. Well done to all the team for their continued commitment enabling us to offer such a valuable service to our patients and families."





LHCH hosts sixth international Aortic Surgery Symposium



We were delighted to host our sixth biennial Aortic Surgery Symposium in Liverpool in June 2015, creating an interactive environment that allowed delegates to review important areas in aortic pathology and advances in surgical and endovascular management.

At this year's event we used pre-recorded procedures with focus on specific aspects of the planning, performance

and outcome of the interventions. A distinguished faculty of international repute also

participated in these exciting discussions.

Congratulations to Len for this outstanding achievement!




#### Out and about...

#### Research and Innovation update

#### LHCH marks International Clinical Trials Day

LHCH marked International Clinical Trials Day on site at the hospital, on local radio and on Twitter!

Patients, families, staff and visitors were welcomed to find out more about clinical trials and the importance of research.

There was also a live 'tweetchat' in partnership with the North West Coast Clinical Research Network, using the hashtag #nwresearch, with a panel of patients and research experts including our LHCH Patient Research Ambassador Keith Wilson, answering questions and providing useful information. The panel were also interviewed by Tony Snell on the lunchtime show when callers were able to take part in the debate.



#### Did you know?

Since 2012, more than 5,000 people have taken part in research and clinical trials at LHCH, and their participation has led to improvements in treatment of surgery, cardiology, respiratory disease / cystic fibrosis, heart failure and cancer. As a result of research and clinical trials, life saving treatments are available.

#### LHCH plays role in national 100,000 Genomes project

LHCH has been named as one of the main recruiting sites for cardiovascular rare conditions and lung cancer in the Liverpool region, as part of the 100,000 Genomes Project.

The project is running on a national scale and focusing on sequencing all the genes (whole genome) of patients with rare diseases and their families, and patients with certain common cancers.

Sequencing 100,000 genomes by 2017 will enable scientists and doctors to understand more about specific conditions and how we treat them and will greatly enhance the genomic diagnostic capability in the NHS as a whole.

LHCH is already recruiting patients for cardiovascular rare conditions led by Consultant Cardiologists Dr Jay Wright and Dr Derick Todd and we are also establishing the processes for lung cancer which is led by Professor Pieter Postmus, Consultant in Thoracic Oncology and Mr Mike Shackcloth, Consultant Thoracic Surgeon.

Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital's involvement in the project puts us at the forefront of this pioneering research.

#### Jeff's Manchester jaunt

Jeff Bannister was an active 54 year old who enjoyed hill walking until he was diagnosed with atrial fibrillation (a condition which causes irregular and often an abnormally fast heart rate).

Jeff's condition began to have a profound effect on his life and his ability to walk the nearby hills of Cheshire became a thing of the past.

Cardioversion treatment (to help regulate Jeff's heart beat) didn't work and in December 2013 Jeff came to Dr Gupta at LHCH for a cardiac ablation (repairing the damaged areas of the heart which cause the irregular rhythms).

Jeff says: "Thanks to Dr Gupta and the team at LHCH, I've got my life back and I can't say how grateful I

am to them as I was afraid that it would never be the same again."

To show how well the treatment worked and to say "thank you" Jeff and his daughter Rachel entered the Great Manchester Run in May and completed the time in a very impressive 72 minutes. They also raised a fantastic £465 for the Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital Charity as well.

Jeff says: "It was fantastic to enter and complete the course and to feel like I could give something back to the people who returned my life to me. I can't thank them enough for all their care and skill".

David says: "I couldn't believe the standard of care I received at LHCH and thanks to the doctors and nurses skill I was home within 3 days and am happily still around to tell the tale".

> The heart attack gave David pause for thought on his general level of fitness and after listening to medical advice, he took up

cycling. He soon realised that, at 59 years old, he had discovered a new love. He says: "Eventually I found I could do 10 miles then 20 miles then 30 miles all without feeling completely wiped out.

Then my good friend Steve entered me into the Liverpool/Chester/Liverpool bike ride and I decided to take up the challenge and, at the same time, try to raise some money for LHCH by asking for sponsorship. Once I was able to ride 40 miles I knew I could do it, and not only did I start to feel fitter I also lost over 50lbs in weight, a real bonus".

5th July 2015 gave David another memorable day when he completed the challenge raising an amazing £825. He says: "Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital has a great reputation with great staff; who help thousands of people every single year. Completing the ride was a fantastic feeling; it's been a long time since I felt that good about myself and knowing I was helping everyone at LHCH was the icing on the cake".

#### 10,000 memories for Lee

Lee Knowles suffered with heart problems from birth, at the age of 5 he underwent ground-breaking aortic valve surgery and although this was meant to be a temporary measure, Lee went on to live a busy and active life becoming a Third Dan black belt karate instructor, a talented sign writer and graphics designer with a love of music that took him to festivals of all kinds – all with the "temporary valve" still in place.

By September 2014 Lee had started to feel the effects of the valves deterioration. And after many meetings with LHCH

consultants it was decided to go ahead with a further valve replacement – despite the risks that the operation carried. The operation went well and Lee was well on his way to recovery but on the day of his discharge he suffered catastrophic heart failure and despite a valiant fight for life that lasted four days, Lee passed away.

His brother Bryn says: "He has left a huge gap in the lives of everyone that knew him, his funeral on 3rd Oct 2014 was attended by over 600 people and his hearse was a converted VW Camper van that epitomised the man he was, a free spirit, dependable and always ready
